SUMMER MEAL PROGRAM FOR KIDS

The Woodward Food Pantry has received grant money to do a pilot summer meal program. The program will operate in July. Food bags will be stocked with kid-friendly items for breakfast, a snack, and one meal (could be used for lunch or dinner). Each child would receive enough food for seven days.

The food bags will be dropped off at the Woodward and Granger Public Libraries and will be available Tuesday through Thursday as supplies last. Library open times at each library are as follows:

Dates the pilot program will be open:

July 8 - 10 July 15 - 17 July 22-24 July 29 - 31

Examples of foods that will be provided are:

Breakfast: Cereal and shelf-stable milk (shelf-stable milk must be refrigerated once it is opened and will be good for 7 days). Snack: Snack bars

Meal: Peanut butter, bread, microwavable mac& cheese, tuna,

fruit (bananas or apples)

WOODWARD COMMUNITY FOOD PANTRY

In October of 2023 there was a shout-out to the community for those interested in getting a food pantry started in Woodward. Seven people showed up. Those people investigated the when, where, how, and other assorted questions, and by March, 2024, the where was answered - basement of the Methodist Church.

Russ Boyles applied for a Myrna Mayfield Grant which was received. A refrigerator, freezer, and insurance

were purchased with this grant money to get the pantry started.

Mike Green accepted the position of President of the Board and he became the chief investigator for how food would come to the pantry. Kari Baetsle joined the team as treasurer to get the pantry on track for income and a budget. Thanks to all in the community who have and are contributing to the pantry and/or volunteering. Donations can be given at EBank.

Grants are a huge part of the pantry's income. In addition to our Mayfield Grant, Kari, Mike, and Gene Grell have worked to receive grants from Frontier Farm Credit, Walmart Grimes, Walmart Boone, Bock Family, Select Farms Haul Out Hunger, EBank, and the City of Woodward. Kasey Morgan & Kari Baetsle have made us aware that some workplaces will donate money based on their employees' volunteer hours.

The pantry was opened in June of 2024, so it has been operating for a year now. Please consider the Woodward Community Food Pantry in your giving. The pantry is open two days a month, the second and fourth Saturdays from 2 to 4. If you are interested in volunteering, call Mike at 515-782-0966.

MYRNA MAYFIELD GRANT

The Myrna Reynoldson Mayfield Trust started in late 2001 and as of 2025 has given a little over \$873,000 to our local community in grants and scholarships. Yes, you read that correctly, eight hundred seventy-three thousand dollars.

Myrna Mayfield was born December 23, 1908 and passed away on May 12, 1999, but we still hear her name mentioned often in the Woodward community because of her legacy, the Myrna Mayfield Grant.

In life, Myrna was an LPN working at the Woodward State Hospital-School. She was a quiet, unassuming woman whom you would often see working in her garden. Community members that remember her say she wasn't a big talker but was a great listener. anonymously giving when she heard about a need seemed to be her way of life: paying for someone's education, helping to pay travel expenses, but because they were always anonymous it is hard to know the extent of that giving. By setting up a Trust with the sale of land she owned in the Madrid area, she has continued to extend this generosity, her legacy, to our community every year.

The Trust is a non-profit organization that makes annual distributions, grants and scholarships in the city of Woodward and adjacent rural areas for educational, civic, cultural, historical, recreational, charitable, religious and other purposes calculated to be of worth to the citizens of the area and consistent with the intentions of the late Myrna Reynoldson Mayfield.

The annual application deadline is April 1. Directors of the trust are Milt Heifner, Rich Danilson, and Mike Ramsey.

Level Up was the theme of the Summer Reading Program that ended on June 27 with Bubble Fun. The Program started on June 2 with a program with Will Stuck, a former Librarian who now travels the United States giving programs. He told stories bringing laughter and fun. After lunch that day, he stayed and taught participants how to draw cartoon characters.

The next program, Diamond Painting, had fifteen in attendance. Using tiny beads, participants designed fun, colorful key chains. On Monday, June 16th, twenty-two attendees enjoyed science experiments that caused fountains of pop to shoot straight up in the sky, watched mixtures produce explosions, or made snow. All the ingredients were household products. The next day, Blank Park Zoo came to the library. Forty-one in attendance enjoyed seeing and learning about a tarantula and a gecko.

On Thursday, June 19, thirty-one were in attendance for Mikayla Oz the Magician. Mikala has been coming every year for the past five years. She entertained and wowed her audience. The biggest hit with the younger set was her white dove, Bubbles. After she made Bubbles disappear, she brought her back and allowed the children to 'high-five' or pet Bubbles' wing. Two paint classes followed later that day, one for kids and the other for adults.

During the final week of June, programming was held every weekday. On Monday, children ages 2 to 5 had fun with Puzzle Dig, where children were digging through rice to find shapes, Food Jigsaws, matching food to the correct shape, and Puzzling Obstacle Course had the children jumping through hoops, and finally Puzzle Pitch, where students tossed small bean bags through different shapes.

Tuesday and Wednesday were the Puzzle Challenge days. One day for K-5 and one day for Teens. Groups were challenged with the task to be the first person to put together a 100-piece puzzles. These puzzles were pictures of familiar cereals—Trix, Cheerios, Cinnamon Toast Crunch, Fruit Loops, and Cocoa Pops.

Thursday was Sand Art Day for all. Each participant created a colorful bottle by filling the bottle with colorful sand. This was followed by the prize party for all of the Summer Reading Participants. On Friday, everyone returned for Bubble Fun.

Some of our Woodward businesses participated by hiding puzzle pieces in their place of business. When anyone found a puzzle piece, they were encouraged to bring it to the library for a prize. Many of the prizes were donated



Woodward Little League Baseball Field Now in Full Swing

The Woodward Little League Baseball Field, completed and ready for play in May 2025, is quickly becoming a hub of activity for youth and families in the area. While there was not enough initial interest to form a local Little League in Woodward, the field has proven to be a valuable resource for traveling and competitive teams from both Woodward and neighboring Granger. Recognizing the importance of supporting local youth athletics, the Woodward City Council voted to waive field use fees for teams from the Woodward and Granger leagues. This generous move sparked immediate interest, and the field is now reserved five nights a week and every Saturday morning.

The field is equipped with a fully operational concession stand and public restrooms, making it a comfortable and convenient venue for both players and spectators. In addition to serving as a practice ground for young athletes, the city is also looking to expand recreational opportunities for all ages. Plans are currently underway for a Fall Adult Kickball Tournament scheduled for September, and excitement is already building for the event. Looking ahead, efforts are being made to launch a Woodward Little League

season in 2026, to create a homegrown league that will serve local youth for years to come.
