WHAT'S THE STORY?

The Mural — Centennial Park. Who would undertake such a big project? **Local artist, Dennis Adams**.

As a boy, Dennis was a paper doodler. He loved drawing, and always had the extra drawings along the sides of his homework. When it was time to find a career, he attended DMACC and was **certified in the art of drafting**.

The big event that changed his course in life was a farming accident at the age of 19, in which he lost his right hand. Being a right-hander, he had to retrain his brain to use his left hand, which was a challenge.

At this time, he was also given a choice to attend the **American Academy of Art in Chicago**. The academy became his first formal art training, because no art classes had even been offered in high school. The American Academy of Art was where he learned about and embraced the creative PROCESS.

Dennis continued his art education at the University of Iowa, where he earned his **Bachelor of Fine Arts**

degree. One of his projects at the **University of Iowa** involved designing two fields, one 30-acre field and another 40-acre field. (And we think the Woodward mural is big!) The *Des Moines Register* covered this amazing artwork in an article titled, "Fruit of Artist's Mind Grow in Iowa," November 27, 1978, byline Robert Modersohn.

Dennis has completed **many large murals** around the country, always researching the most meaningful way he can communicate a message through his work. Involving school children to help create the background colors for a mural has given many kids and adults a great memory.

The **original watercolor** of the Woodward mural is displayed in the library. An explanation of the mural, taken from the centennial book, **Through the Years**:

Each image in the collage represents at least one aspect of Woodward's history. According to Hastie's History of Dallas Center, "the last buffalo in Dallas Center was killed almost exactly where Woodward is now." On the left side of the mural is the face of an Indian, which signifies the Indians who were present in the area. The Indian was named Two Hatchets and belonged to the Kiowa tribe. The team of horses serves a dual purpose. First, the team signifies agriculture. Second, when the community of Xenia was moved to be nearer the railroad depot, which was relocated to the site of present day Woodward, teams of horses were used as the mode of transportation.

Two locomotives are pictured. One locomotive is a coal-burning steam engine commonly used in the late 1800's. It not only signifies the railroad's part in Woodward's history, but the coal mining in the area as well. Also pictured is a streamlined steam locomotive which was used from the early 1930's to the early 1950's and was called a Midwestern Hiawatha.

To bring the town's history up to date, the collage includes the grain elevators in the sunset.

"The Cedar Valley Road," with Linda McCann, on Saturday, July 9th, at 10 AM at the Woodward Library.

The Cedar Valley Road was an electric railroad that ran between Waverly and Cedar Rapids. It ran for 50 years. The "trolley" changed the Cedar Valley. People could attend high school or college, because they rode on the RR. Farmers used it to send their eggs or produce to other towns. A bakery would send bread out on the interurban, and people stood along the tracks to get their bread. It saved people's lives, because they were able to go to lowa City for treatment.
